Tips for a Successful Group Discussion

- 1. Meet somewhere where parents feel comfortable speaking freely and openly and set some ground rules. Some suggestions are someone's home or a reserved room at a community center. Decide how to set up the room based on number attending and meeting format. Some options: lecture style, one long table or several round tables.
- 2. Decide how long the meeting will be and stick with it. One hour is good. Set aside a few minutes at the beginning for mingling. Folks can stay after to mingle as well.
- 3. Provide snacks! Snacks can be simple water bottles and cookies are always a winner.
- 4. Be bold: at end of meeting, declare the group's intention to hold off on social media through middle school (or longer) and invite others to make the commitment alongside you. Example: "We plan to delay social media for our kids through 8th grade. There are seven families in this group already committed. We hope you will join us."
- 5. Recap major points made during meeting before you wrap up. For example, "Some recurring themes I heard today from our speaker (or panelists) were.....".
- 6. Thank parents & guardians for attending the meeting. "We appreciate you taking the time to discuss this important issue & band together for the best interest of our children."
- 7. Follow-up: send out an email reiterating key points made during the meeting (see #5 above). You might want to send out a Google survey afterwards to gauge commitment for delaying smart phones or social media. Consider a Facebook page for parents to post updates and relevant articles.
- 8. Decide how often your group will meet. Our group meets twice a year May and November.
- 9. The discussion needs to be parent-led whenever possible to increase connection within the group. Even if you bring in an outside speaker, the opening and closing of the meeting should be parent-led. Maybe one parent opens the meeting and a parent from a different family closes the meeting. The more organic the discussion can be the better connection among the families is key.
